


Foreward

The Constitution of Kenya and The Kenya **Vision 2030** and its Medium-Term Plans provide the foundation for the preparation of the County Integrated Development Plans (CIDPs) for all the 47 counties in the Republic of Kenya. The purpose of this CIDP is to provide the framework for socio—economic development as prioritised by stakeholders in the County. This Second Vihiga County Integrated Development Plan has been modelled on the framework provided by the Third Medium—Term Plan and the Kenya **Vision 2030**. The Kenya **Vision 2030** aims at transforming Kenya into "a newly industrialized middle-income country providing high quality life to all its citizens by the year 2030".

The Vision developed on the basis of Foundations of National Transformation that support three pillars: Economic, Social and Political. The Vision specifies the sectors that support each pillar. The Vision also identified a number of flagship projects to be implemented across the country for all sectors and this CIDP has identified flagship projects and programmes that will be implemented to help in attaining the national vision. The projects and programmes in this CIDP were identified through public participation forums and specifications of Governor's manifesto.

This CIDP was developed around seven priority areas that will provide the focus for implementation in the next five years. The priority areas include promotion of good governance and eradicating corruption in the county; developing an educated, skilled and knowledgeable society; creating opportunities for youth employment and wealth creation through Agri-business, Entrepreneurship, Technology and Innovation; Promoting primary healthcare and clean water and sanitation as the foundation for a healthy County; Developing local industry, strategic partnerships and a reliable transport and communication infrastructure network to spur growth in the county; Promoting Sustainable development and Conservation of our Environment and promoting County unity and public participation in government-led development initiatives. The CIDP will lay more emphasis on the implementation of the big four development programmes prioritized by His Excellency the President, namely; Universal Healthcare, affordable housing, manufacturing and food security. During the plan period, Green Economy strategies that aim at reducing environmental risks and ecological scarcities will be pursued. Production, that is, low carbon, resource efficient and socially inclusive will be adopted. To this end, the County shall promote use of solar energy, biogas production technology, organic farming, sustainable infrastructural development and natural resource management.

It is expected that increased public participation during projects and programmes identification, planning, implementation, Monitoring and Evaluation will help enhance the goal of devolution which is to empower citizens to exercise their democratic rights to realise social, political and economic development.





Emphasis will be placed on implementation of the proposed development priorities with establishment of Vihiga 2018 -2022 CIDP Implementation, Monitoring and Reporting Secretariat under my office. The secretariat will be charged with reporting the impact of implementing the proposed projects and programmes and monitoring the overall social—economic impact to the Vihiga citizenry.

The successful implementation of this CIDP will depend on numerous factors which include political goodwill, availability of resources, harmonious cooperation and coordination between the national and county governments, support from development partners and professionals from the county, support and cooperation of the people of Vihiga County, focused and well-coordinated monitoring and evaluation strategy among others.

Executive Summary

This second CIDP identifies key policy actions, reforms, programmes and projects that the County will implement in the 2018-2022 period in line with its priorities, the *Constitution of Kenya*, 2010 and the long-term objective of **Vision 2030**. Accordingly, the theme of this CIDP is transforming Vihiga into a county with optimum socio-economic and political sustainability and an equitable and secure society.

County General Information: This Chapter outlines the socio-economic and demographic information of Vihiga County. It presents the location and size, physiographic and natural conditions, demographic profiles as well as the administrative and political units. Moreover, it covers: forestry development, climate change and environment, mining, tourism, income generation and employment, water and sanitation, access to health and nutrition and education and literacy.

Setting the Context of the 2018-22 CIDP: The **Kenya Vision 2030** aims to make Kenya a middle-income country by 2030. The delivery of that target is driven by a series of 5-year Medium-term Plans (MTPs) and 5-year County Integrated Development Plans (CIDPs). This is the second CIDP for Vihiga County for the period 2018-22.

The **Vision 2030** is supported by three contextual pillars; the economic, the social and the political pillars. The three pillars are anchored on foundations of national transformation.

The Constitution entrenches devolution that will play a major role in service delivery and give all Kenyans key social and economic rights. In August 2017, the Vihiga County citizenry elected a new government, whose policy manifesto "Transforming Vihiga into a County with optimum socio-economic and political sustainability and an equitable and secure society" highlights the County Government's priorities over the next five years. This CIDP has been formulated, taking into account both the Constitution and the priorities of the County Government's manifesto.

This CIDP builds on the achievements of the 2013-17 CIDP while considering the critical, remaining and emerging challenges during that plan period. This CIDP has been aligned to the Kenya **Vision 2030** and the MTPs with regard to the foundations of national transformation, the economic, social and political pillars. The CIDP approaches the Constitution's Fourth Schedule on devolved functions and aligns them to the Kenya **Vision 2030** philosophy and the implementing MTPs.

This CIDP will integrate the proposed international community development goals now known as Global Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) for the post 2015 period.

Foundations of National Transformation: Achievement of programme and project goals in the economic, social and political pillars is dependent on specific foundations namely, Transport, Infrastructure and Communication, Administration and Coordination of County Affairs, Land






Reforms, Values and Ethics, Security, Peace Building and Conflict Resolution and Own Sources of Revenue Reforms.

The Economic Pillar: Kenya Vision 2030 identified six priority sectors with high potential of spurring the country's economic growth and development. The sectors are: tourism, agriculture and livestock, wholesale and retail trade, manufacturing, business process outsourcing/IT Enabled Services and financial services. These sectors will drive achievement of 10 per cent GDP growth by 2017. In this regard, the County Government of Vihiga in line with the Fourth Schedule of the Constitution, has identified Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Co-operatives and Trade, Industry, Tourism and Entrepreneurship as priority sectors to drive the County's economic growth.

The Social Pillar: The sectors which make up the social pillar include Education, Science and Technical Vocational Training, Health Services, Environment, Water, Energy and Natural Resources, Physical Planning, Land and Housing, Youth, Gender, Sports, Culture and Social Services. This CIDP will focus on implementation of policies, programmes and projects in each of these sectors to ensure that they contribute towards prosperity and building a just and cohesive society that enjoys equitable social development in a clean and secure environment.

Political Pillar: The Political Pillar envisages a democratic political system that is issue-based, people-centred, result-oriented and accountable to the public. Since the inauguration of the Constitution, progress has been made in advancing strategic political, governance and institutional reforms and these include; enactment of legislation mandated by the Constitution, establishment of new governance institutions at National and County levels, civic education, judicial transformation, police reforms, reforms in prisons and correctional services, changes in the electoral processes, promoting national cohesion and social integration, transparency and accountability and the rule of law. In addition, the *Constitution of Kenya*, 2010 devolves considerable functions and powers to the county governments, which include agriculture, health services, control of air and other pollution, cultural activities, transport, animal control and welfare, trade development, planning and development, pre-primary education, natural resources and environmental conservation, public works and services, fire–fighting services and disaster management, control of drugs and pornography and coordinating participation of communities. This CIDP will focus on development and implementation of good governance system and promotion of public participation in government planning and decision-making processes.

Conclusion: The policies, legal and institutional reforms that are required for the successful implementation of this CIDP are elaborated in subsequent sections of this document. The County Government will continue to partner with all the stakeholders to ensure fulfilment of the aspirations of citizenry. The County Government will also uphold the principle of co-operative government and embrace consultations within its organs and the National Government as envisaged in the Constitution.

CHAPTER 1 LEGAL FRAMEWORK



Vihiga County Court Users Committee



1.1 Background

The Constitution of Kenya, 2010 created a two-tier system of governance, a National and devolved county governments, that are distinct and interdependent and thus requires a paradigm shift in development planning. Article 220(2) (a) of the Constitution states that, "National legislation shall prescribe the structure of the development plans and budgets of counties". The Fourth Schedule of the Constitution assigns specific functions to each level of government. Several Acts of Parliament are in place to provide the legal framework for the implementation of this Article 220 (2). They include the County Government Act, 2012, the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 and the Urban Areas and Cities Act 2011.

1.2 Integrated Development Planning

Integrated development planning is defined as a process through which efforts of national and devolved levels of government and other relevant stakeholders are co-ordinated at local level, through which economic, social, environmental, legal and spatial aspects of development are brought together to produce a plan that meets the needs and sets the targets for the benefit of local communities.

1.3 Policies and Legislative Framework for Development Planning in Kenya

The Constitution

Article 220 (2) of the Constitution provides that the national legislation shall prescribe the structure of development plans and budgets of counties. Article 201 further sets out the principles of public finance that should be adhered to. These principles include accountability, openness, public participation and promotion of an equitable society.

The Kenya Vision 2030

The aim of the Kenya **Vision 2030** economic blueprint is to create "a globally competitive and prosperous nation with a high quality of life by 2030". It also aims to transform Kenya into "a newly industrialising, middle income country providing a high quality of life to all its citizens in a clean and secure environment". The Vision will be implemented through successive five years Medium-Term Plans at the national level and the CIDPs at the county level.

The County Governments Act, 2012

The County Government Act, 2012, in fulfilment of the constitutional requirement to legislate preparation of county plans, details the goals and procedures of "County Planning" (Part XI of the Act). Counties are required to prepare five-year County Integrated Development Plans (CIDPs) pursuant to Section 108 (1) of the Act. Section 109 of the Act requires each county department to prepare ten-year Sector Plans (SPs) that are integral parts of the CIDPs.





Section 102 (h) provides that county planning is expected "to provide a platform for unifying planning, budgeting, financing programmes, implementation and performance review". A county planning unit shall be responsible for "co-ordinated integrated development planning". County plans will have the goal of promoting harmony with national and other county plans, land-use plans, urban planning and environmental conservation.

Further, Section 104 (1) of the Act states that, "a county government shall plan for the county and no public funds shall be appropriated without a planning framework developed by the County Executive Committee and approved by the County Assembly". It also states that the county planning framework shall integrate economic, physical, social, environmental and spatial planning. In addition to CIDPs and SPs, each county is expected to have the following:

- (i) County Spatial Plan; and
- (ii) City and Urban Areas Plan.

Section 107(2) provides that the said plans "shall be the basis for all the budgeting and planning in a county".

The Public Finance Management Act, 2012 (PFMA)

The Public Finance Management Act, 2012, emphasises what the County Government Act states but puts a slightly different emphasis on planning. Whereas the County Government Act requires the ten-year SPs and five-year CIDPs, Section 126 of the PFMA requires preparation of Annual Development Plans (ADPs) that will specifically describe the development plans that the county will undertake in the following five years, the Medium-Term. Chronologically, the plans flow from the ten-year SPs to five CIDPs then the one-year ADPs. According to the PFMA, a budget process for the county government in any financial year shall consist of the following stages:


- (i) Start with an integrated development planning process, which shall contain both short-term and medium-term plans.
- (ii) Every county shall prepare a development plan as per Article 220 (2) of the Constitution.
- (iii) Budgets are to be based on programmes, projects and other expenditure contained in the plan.

The Urban Areas and Cities Act, 2011

Urban Areas and Cities Act is also emphatic on the need for five-year integrated development planning and the need to align annual budgeting to the plan. In Section 36 (2), it states that "an integrated urban or city development plan shall bind, guide, and inform all planning for development and decision-making and ensure comprehensive inclusion of functions." The plans should, however, be linked to the CIDP.

The Intergovernmental Relations Act, 2012

Part II of the Intergovernmental Relations Act, 2012, establishes the Summit responsible for monitoring of county development plans and recommending appropriate action. Section 12 of the Act also establishes the Intergovernmental Relations Technical Committee (IGRTC) which provides secretariat services to the Summit and Council of Governors. In addition, Section 20 (f) established the Council of Governors with a mandate to co-ordinate the receiving of reports and monitoring the implementation of inter-county agreements on inter-county projects.





The Roadmap

The CIDP processes started with a robust citizen engagement process. Firstly, the engagement was done across all the wards by the executive. The citizens gave their views regarding development priorities for 2018-2022. These views are annexed on this CIDP. The engagement was repeated at the sub-county level for the sake of validating the public participation report that had been prepared based on the feedback received at the ward level. This was followed by a County validation conference that brought on board professionals residing within and outside the County as well as key stakeholders in the county. The priorities gathered from all the stakeholders were designed into sector programmes alongside the Governor's manifesto. The CIDP was approved at the County Executive Committee Chaired by the Governor and forwarded to the County Assembly as required by the law. Prior to approval by the County Assembly, the CIDP was further subjected to public participation and the views from the same are annexed at the end of this CIDP.


Last and not least the approved CIDP was published and officially launched for implementation in August 2018.


2.1 Overview

2.2 Administration and Co-ordination of County Affairs

Location and Size of the County

Vihiga County is located in the Lake Victoria Basin of western region of Kenya between longitudes 34°30' and 35°0'E and latitudes 0° and 0°15'N. The County covers an area of 531.0 Km².

County Administrative Units


The County has five sub-counties, namely Hamisi, Emuhaya, Luanda, Sabatia and Vihiga. Hamisi is the most expansive with an area of 156.4 Km², Sabatia 110.9 Km², Vihiga 90.2 Km², Emuhaya 89.5 Km² and Luanda 84 Km². There are twenty-five electoral wards within the five sub-counties.

Population Size and Composition

According to the 2009 National Population and Housing Census, the County had a population of 554,622. The county has one of the highest population densities in the country at 1,033 persons per square kilometre compared to the national average of 66 persons per square kilometre. 47.8% of the population were male while 52.2% were female. The county population is estimated to have grown to 637,877 persons in 2017 and is projected to grow to 694,819 in 2022. The county's demographic profile depicts a youthful population comprising of 46% of persons aged below 15 years.

2.3 Transport, Infrastructure and Communication

Road and Rail Network

The total road network in the County is 1,058.2 Km; of that, bitumen surface covers 201.5 Km, gravel surface 373.7 Km and earth surface 483 Km. The County has a railway length of 20 Km and has one railway station at Luanda that is not in operation. The County has no operational airstrip and relies on the neighbouring counties for flight services. The Kaimosi airstrip is currently not operational.

Posts and Telecommunications

There are 16 post offices and four private couriers, spread across the county. The mobile telephone network coverage is 80%. However, there are some parts of the county that experience poor network coverage due to landscape.

Financial Institutions

There are five (5) commercial banks in the County, namely Kenya Commercial Bank, Equity Bank, Cooperative Bank, Post Bank and Barclays Bank. There are also micro-finance institutions namely; Rafiki Bank, Kenya Women Finance Trust and 46 registered SACCOs. Despite the presence of these financial institutions, access to credit is still a major challenge.

2.4 Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Co-operatives

Crop Production

The arable land is 404.8 Km² being 76% of the County's area coverage. The main crops in the county include tea, coffee, bananas and horticulture crops. Other food crops include maize, beans, cassava, sweet potatoes, vegetables, millet and sorghum. Majority of farmers plant at least two crops for food through intercropping during the long rains (April-June) and short rains (September-November).

Livestock Production

The main breeds of livestock kept in the County include zebu cattle, dairy cattle, poultry, sheep, goats, pigs and rabbits. The annual milk production is 28,500,000 litres. Indigenous chicken is the main poultry reared with annual egg production of 15,574,550. Guinea fowls rearing and apiculture are emerging enterprises in the county. The annual honey production is 69,000 litres.





Fish Production

The county has 2,819 farmers engaged in aquaculture activities, most of whom practise semiintensive farming through fish ponds. The fish ponds cover a total area of 84.57ha with the main fish species being tilapia and catfish. The county also has one private fish hatchery in Hamisi Sub-County and one private cottage fish feed producer based in Luanda.

Storage facilities

The available storage facilities in the County are NCPB silos, improved granaries, traditional stores and bags. The silos are located in Chavakali and Hamisi market centres. However, they operate below capacity due to low crop production. The county does not have sufficient storage facilities that support livestock, horticulture and fish farming.

2.5 Trade, Industry, Tourism and Entrepreneurship

Mining and Mining Potential


Gold mining is practised on small scale basis in Luanda South, Izava/Lyaduywa, South Maragoli and Muhudu wards due to lack of technology and equipment. Prospecting for gold and other minerals is underway at Kichutu in Viyalo, Chavakali and Shiru wards. Currently, the granite rocks are transported by middlemen outside the county for processing and then re-sold as building materials such as ballast, terrazzo chips and ornamental stone.

Sulphide and photolytic rocks that produce acids and building gravels respectively are in abundance and unexploited due to poor mining technology. Weathering of Kavirondian sediments which lead to formation of micaceous clays are widely spread in the northern part of the county. These clays are suitable for brick baking and pottery. Sand deposits occur locally in most stream beds particularly within the granitic terrain in the southern part of the county. Due to steep gradients, much of the sand is, however, washed down and deposited downstream.

Tourism and Tourist Attractions

The County has potential for domestic and international tourism. The landscape is endowed with caves, hills and forests ideal for adventure, hiking and eco-tourism. Main attractions include the Maragoli and Bunyore Hills, Mungoma Caves, Kibiri and Kaimosi forest, rainmakers' shrines at Esibila, tea fields, Mudete Tea Factory, wetlands and Wagevere rocks embossed with 'footprints of Jesus' in Matsigulu. The county also has a rich culture which can create an opportunity for the development of cultural tourism, as well as diverse talent for sports.

Conducive climate and landscape ambience provide opportunities for prosperous hospitality industry. There are a number of hotels, easily accessible and distributed across the County. They include Sosa Cottages, Roddy's Green Lounge, Broadpark Hotel, Hemara Hotel, Hermoso Hotel, Mago Guest House and Luanda Oasis Hotel. There is great opportunity to invest in hotels and campsites to tap into the Western Kenya Tourism Circuit that cuts across the neighbouring counties of Kakamega and Kisumu.





Manufacturing and Food Processing

The county has one tea processing factory situated at Mudete and milk cooling plants. Total tea production is estimated to be 10.6 million Kilograms annually. Milk production is 28.5 million litres which does not meet the county demand. There are Constituencies Industrial Development Centres (CIDC) established under Economic Stimulus Programme (ESP) in Mwibona, Manyatta, Chavakali and Hamisi but they are currently under-utilized.

2.6 Education, Science and Technical Vocational Training

Education Facilities

The number of primary schools was 475 in 2017, secondary schools 157, early childhood centres 852, adult learning centres 107 and technical and vocational training centres 31. During the same period, KMTC and Kaimosi University Colleges were established at Mbale and Kaimosi respectively adding to the existing tertiary colleges, namely Ebunangwe University Campus, Friends Kaimosi Institute of Technology, Vihiga, St Joseph's, Goibei and Kaimosi Teachers Colleges. The National Government and other development partners have embarked on the establishment of Vihiga University College at Vokoli in Sabatia Sub-County.

Education and Literacy

Enrolments in early childhood education improved since 2013 with current enrolment of 41,278. This can be attributed to improved access to ECD infrastructure and awareness campaigns on ECDE

Enrolment in primary schools has also steadily increased over the last four years (2013-17). The increase in enrolment was due to free primary education policy. Despite the improved enrolments and gender parity in primary schools, an emerging trend of low retention and high dropout remains a challenge in the county.


Enrolment in secondary schools has also improved since 2013 with gender parity index of 1:1, other achievement include the increase in the number of secondary schools.

82.1% of the adult population in county are literate. However, there is need to promote continued learning in the wake of emerging technology. Enrolment in public vocational training centre remains low at a current figure of 2,890 due to the perception that it is only failures that are expected to enrol in these centres or polytechnics.

2.7 Health Services

Health Facilities and Personnel

The county has one public county referral facility, Vihiga County Hospital at Mbale. The other major health facility is Jumuia Hospital in Kaimosi. There are three level 4 facilities in Sabatia, Hamisi and Emuhaya. There are also 18 health centres, 32 dispensaries and 34 private and mission-based facilities. The average distance to the nearest facility is 5 Km. The county doctor to population ratio is 1:11,840 against the national doctors to population of 1:16,520. The county nurse to population ratio is 1:1,947. The County Government intends to recruit more nurses to address the gap to move towards the required international standard of 1:1,000.





Morbidity

Malaria, HIV and AIDS related illness, upper and lower tract infections, diabetes, hypertension, cancer, diarrhoea and skin diseases are the most prevalent causes of morbidity and mortality. HIV prevalence rate is 4.7% against the national figure of 5.6%. The most infected age group the age bracket is of 15-49 years with women being the most affected. Malaria prevalence rate is 27%, diarrhoea 5.4%, respiratory diseases (upper and lower), and skin diseases 19.3%. The high prevalence of malaria can be attributed to the fact that 43.2% of children less than 5 years do not sleep under treated mosquito nets. Other factors that contribute to morbidity include consumption of contaminated food and water, adverse weather conditions, poor nutrition as well as accidents involving motor cycles and assaults related injuries.

Nutritional Status, Prevalence of Stunting and Wasting

Malnutrition is an outcome of complex interaction of many factors which include disease, child care and food intake. The interactions of these factors lead to stunting, wasting and conditions of micronutrient deficiencies in children. In the county, 21% of the total population of children under the age of five are either underweight, stunted or have wasting condition. Of this population, 3.8% are underweight, 14.6% stunting and 2.6% wasting.

Immunisation Coverage

Immunisation of children is crucial to reducing infant and child mortality. The immunisation coverage for the county for the children under 5 is 80.2 % according to KDHS 2014.


Access to Family Planning

The awareness of family planning services in the county is above 90% with contraceptive usage at 56.6% according to KDHS report 2014. A total of 25.8% of married women of ages 15-49 have unmet need for family planning. There is need to provide a number of opportunities to improve reproductive health, including increasing access to and use of family planning services. Male involvement in family planning programmes is also crucial in addressing reproductive health and family planning issues. The maternal mortality ratio in the county is 344 per 100,000 live births against the national 362 per 100,000. This could be attributed to many incidences of home deliveries common in the county, inaccessibility to health facilities, deliveries by untrained birth attendants and inadequate medical staff and equipment.

2.8 Environment, Water, Energy and Natural Resources

Physiographic and Natural Conditions

The county's altitude ranges between 1300 m and 1800 m above sea level. It slopes gently from East to West with undulating hills and valleys. The streams flow from northeast to southwest draining into Lake Victoria. River Yala is the only major river passing through the county with major tributaries, namely Edzava, Zaaba and Garagoli. The county experiences high river erosion due to its hilly landscape. The geographical formation of the county is composed of Kavirondian and Nyanzian rocks with notable ones being in Tambua, Jepkoyai, Emabungo and Maragoli Hills. The soils in the county are mainly sedimentary in nature and support various farming activities.





Vihiga County is categorized into two main agro-ecological zones, the upper and lower midlands. These zones dictate land-use patterns and population settlement in the county. The upper midland zone comprising of Hamisi, Sabatia and parts of Vihiga sub-counties is well-drained with fertile soils. The lower midland zone comprising Emuhaya and Luanda sub-counties has the red loamy sand soils derived from sedimentary and basalt rocks.

The county experience equatorial type of climate with fairly well distributed rainfall throughout the year with an average annual precipitation of 1900 mm. Temperatures range between 14°C – 32°C with a mean temperature of 23°C. Long rains are experienced in the months of March, April and May while short rains are experienced in the months of September, October and November. The driest and hottest months are December, January and February with an average humidity of 41.75%.

Water Resources and Quality

The current daily water demand in the county is 52,912 m³ against 8,889 m³ safe water produced from piped water schemes within the county. The population with access to safe and adequate water in the county is 64% out of which 16.8% have access to piped water and the rest are 83.2 % served with point source supply. The average accessibility to water is 15 minutes. There are 23 piped water supply schemes within the county some of which are operational while others are under rehabilitation. The major water schemes are Mbale, Maseno, Kaimosi, Sosiani, Hamisi, Vihiga, Vokoli and Kaptech water supplies.


The water table is comprised of both surface and ground water. Surface water is available through the year. The main water sources for domestic use are springs, shallow wells and rivers. The County is promoting rain water harvesting. The water resources are however on the decline both in quantity and quality. The major cause of the declining quantity is the planting of eucalyptus trees along the river banks and encroachment of wetlands. The quality of water is also affected by inappropriate farming practices upstream, improper solid and liquid waste management as well as soil erosion. Unimproved sources include ponds, dams, stream/river, unprotected spring, unprotected wells, water vendors and others.

Sanitation

85% county residents use improved sanitation. The County Government is in the process of improving sanitation in public facilities, urban and market centres by constructing public sanitary facilities. The county does not have a sewerage system. A fraction of the public and private institutions rely on septic tanks with options of improved pit latrines within their premises.

Energy

Urban household access to electricity is 12% whereas that of the rural is 7.0 %. 82% of households use firewood as the main source of cooking fuel while 88.7% use paraffin for lighting. 52 health centres and 164 schools have access to electricity. There are strategies to re-establish the mini hydroelectric power station at Kaimosi dam. Promotion of solar and biogas as an alternative source of energy must be pursued in line with SDG requirements for affordable and clean energy.





Forestry and Agroforestry

The main forest is tropical rain forest covering a total area of 4,160.9 hectares. These are Kibiri forest consisting of indigenous and exotic tree species on a 3,691.3ha, Maragoli forest consisting of 469.3ha of exotic tree species and Kaimosi forest which is also facing destruction due to human activities. There are also community forests and private forests. Eucalyptus form about 70% of the tree species grown in farms.

Forest products in the county include timber, fuel wood, charcoal, construction poles, and medicine among others. Other than the tropical rain forest which is gazetted, the rest are on farmlands. Non-gazetted forests cover an area of 48ha. Kibiri forest comprises of both exotic and indigenous high value soft wood trees. Maragoli forest comprised of exotic soft woods that have since been cleared and the area urgently requires rehabilitation.

Farmers in the county have small-woodlots and trees dotted all along the landscape on their small farms where they generate small incomes from forest products such as timber poles, firewood and charcoal. Farmers are also encouraged to engage in alternative sources of generating income in an effort to protect and conserve the forests. The Kenya Forest Service (KFS) is collaborating with other stakeholders to plant trees in major towns, market centres, along roads, schools and other public places in the County.

In collaboration with other stakeholders, local farmers and local herbal practitioners are encouraged to plant high value medicinal and indigenous tree species in their farmlands.

Environment and Climate Change

The major contributors to environmental degradation and climate change in the County are; carbon emission, increased human activities including poor farming practices, deforestation, sand harvesting, mining, unplanned urbanisation and ineffective environmental awareness campaigns.

Environmental degradation has led to adverse weather patterns and, therefore, low farm yields hence food insecurity. Natural disasters such as hailstorms and landslides have also become rampant. Wetlands are fast diminishing in size due to human activities such as deforestation and planting of unfriendly species of trees close to wetlands and riparian land. The degradation has resulted in water pollution leading to increased incidences of water borne diseases.

Strategies to address these effects involve promotion and protection of river banks, soil conservation, indigenous forestation, capacity building of environmental committees and the community on environmental conservation. The county endeavours to comply with the Environmental Management and Co-ordination Act, 1999 to address the aforementioned challenges. The County also strives to adopt environmentally sustainable methods that preserve and enhance soil and ground water. These include, terracing to prevent soil loss and degradation through erosion, radically reducing tillage, encouraging crop rotation and use of farmland manure as opposed to artificial fertilizers. Farmers are educated to continually adjust cultivation and breeding practices to varying climate conditions.





2.9 Physical Planning, Land and Housing

Urban Centres

The urban centres are Mbale, Chavakali, Jeptulu, Vihiga and Luanda whose estimated population in 2009 was 86,750 and is projected to be 108,886 by 2022. Other emerging urban centres are Kilingili, Esibuye, Serem, Gambogi, Jebrok, Sabatia, Hamisi, Gisambai and Mudete. The growth in the urban centres is attributed to rural-urban migration. The urban centres attract population in search of employment and access to better social amenities. The growing population in these towns will require proper integrated planning for improved social amenities such as housing, sewerage systems, solid waste disposal facilities and increased capacity in schools and hospitals.


Population Density and Distribution

According to the 2017 population projections, Sabatia had the highest population density of 1,344 persons per Km² followed by Luanda 1,298 persons per Km², Vihiga 1,168 persons per Km², Hamisi 1,091 persons per Km² and Emuhaya 1,085 persons per Km². In 2020, the population density is projected to increase to 1,417 persons per Km² in Sabatia, Emuhaya 1,143 persons per Km², Vihiga 1,231 persons per Km², Luanda 1,368 persons per Km² and Hamisi, 1,149 persons per Km². In 2022, the population densities are projected to increase to 1,468 persons per Km² in Sabatia, Emuhaya 1,184 persons per Km², Vihiga 1,275 persons per Km², Luanda 1,416 persons per Km² and Hamisi 1,190 persons per Km².

Housing Types, Markets and Urban Centres

There are 146 market centres in the county. These market centres lack adequate basic utilities including water, electricity and waste management system.

Housing in the county is characterised by type of walling, floor and roof materials. Of the total number of households, mud or wooden walled houses comprise 74.8%, 71.3% of houses are made of earth floors and 94.2% have corrugated iron sheet roofs. The predominant flooring materials used by most households in the county are earth, mud, dung and sand a share of cement and tiles.

Land

The average farm size in the county is 0.4ha for small scale and 3ha for large scale farming. In terms of land use, 98.7% of the arable land is under farming, mostly subsistence, while 1.3% is under housing. The main land use types include livestock, crop farming, tree planting fish farming and settlements. Other land use activities are soil mining for brick making, pot making, house construction, sand harvesting and stone mining.

Proportion of parcels with title deeds is 28.3% while the rest are communal. Women and youths ownership of land titles deeds is also low due to cultural barriers. This has limited access to credit from financial institutions. The high population density in the county has also led to further subdivisions of land into uneconomical parcels.

The proportion of households without land is 3%. Landlessness has been contributed by forceful acquisition of land and increasing population. The situation has led to invasion of Maragoli hills and Kibiri forests for settlement. The county has also experienced migration to neighbouring counties of Siaya, Nandi, Kakamega, Trans Nzoia and Bungoma.

2.10 Youth, Gender, Sports, Culture and Social Services

Human Development Index (HDI)

There are six basic pillars of human development: equity, sustainability, productivity, empowerment, Co-operation and security. The human development paradigm takes people as the primary actors in improving their own welfare through economic, social and political empowerment. The basic objective of development is to create an enabling environment in which people can enjoy long, healthy and creative lives. Article 27 of the *Constitution of Kenya*, 2010 stipulates that measures should be put in place to encourage affirmative action programmes, plans and policies to address past inequalities. Economic and social rights to all are also recognised in Article 43.

The HDI provides a composite measure of three dimensions of human development: living a long and healthy life (measured by life expectancy), being educated (measured by adult literacy and enrolment at the primary, secondary and tertiary level) and having a decent standard of living (measured by purchasing power parity and per capita income).

For the county, the critical HDI are life expectancy, infant mortality, adult literacy, school enrolment, retention, performance, and transition in primary, secondary and tertiary levels, gender parity and per capita income. According to UNDP, HDI of 1 indicates the best welfare scenario. The county HDI is 0.5003 compared to the national HDI of 0.52. This is a drop of 9.3 % from the 2013 county





HDI of 0.5516. The county's life expectancy is 56.2 years compared to national average of 63.4 years. The infant mortality in the county is estimated at 64/1000 against a national average of 39/1000. The county adult literacy level stands at 93.8 % as compared to national figure of 78 %. The primary school Gross Enrolment Rate (GER) was 116 % whereas the secondary school GER is 48.5 % compared to the national figures of 103.6 % and 62.9 % respectively. The Maternal Mortality Rate (MMR) is at 344/100,000, compared to national's 362/100,000. The county poverty level is at 39 % compared to national's 45%. This is a decrease of 2 % from the previous planning period 2013-2017. The reduction of poverty level is attributed to various interventions by both County and National Governments such as: NG-CDF, Poverty Eradication Fund, Uwezo Fund, Cash Transfer and the Vihiga County Community Empowerment Fund, among others. The HIV and AIDS prevalence rate in the County was estimated at 4.7% in 2015 against a national average of 5.91%. This affects virtually all the aspects of the HDI.

The Youth Development Index (YDI) is a composite measure of youth development which is an important measure of HDI. This measures youth participation in politics, development and their productivity among other spectres of life. Vihiga YDI is currently at 0.56, a 0.025 point drop from the 2013 YDI of 0.535. The national YDI stands at 0.56.

The county, therefore, needs to integrate its plans and programmes with development stakeholders including the National Government, civil society, national and international development partners as well as private sector to ensure sustainable improvement of the county's HDI.

Employment

High percentage of wage earners in the County is in agriculture and rural development sector. Agriculture provides 70% of employment opportunities. The urban self-employed comprise 4% of the total labour force while 34% of labour force is rural based. The rural population is predominantly self-employed engaging in small scale businesses and farming. The urban self-employment includes those in businesses including shop keeping, hotels, chemists, hair dressing, foodstuff trade, cottage industry, among others.


The County's labour force 15-64 years is 282,761 which represent 49% of the working population projected in 2017. The composition of this labour force was 55% female and 45% male. Youth unemployment has increased with the diminishing opportunities for formal employments. This has led to high dependency ratio and inability of the few employed to save and invest. Cases of insecurity associated with youth unemployment are also on the rise.

Community Organisations and Non-State Actors

There are 78 registered co-operative societies in the County of which 47 are active. They comprise; 23 marketing, 46 savings and credit, 5 housing, 2 industrial and 2 multi-purpose. The membership of co-operative societies is 21,972 of which 14,900 are active with KES 54, 600,000 in share capital.

Non-State Actors play a key role in the development. Several NGOs, CBOs and CSOs operate within the County in diverse activities including health, education, agriculture, governance, rural development, water and sanitation subsectors.

There are 7,546 self-help groups in the County which include women and youth groups engaging in various development activities. Some of the priority areas they cover include poverty alleviation, water and sanitation, environment, national cohesion, welfare and health. Sustainability of these groups has been a major challenge that has rendered some of them inactive.

CHAPTER 3

Setting the Context of the 2018-22 CIDP

3.1 Overview

The Kenya **Vision 2030** aims to make Kenya a middle-income country by 2030. The delivery of that target is driven by a series of 5-year Medium-term Plans (MTPs) and 5-year County Integrated Development Plans (CIDPs). This is the second CIDP for Vihiga County for the period 2018-22.

The **Vision 2030** is supported by three contextual pillars; the economic pillar, the social pillar and the political pillar. The three pillars are anchored on foundations of national transformation.

The Constitution entrenches devolution that will play a major role in service delivery and give all Kenyans key social and economic rights. In August 2017, the Vihiga County citizenry elected a new government, whose policy manifesto "Transforming Vihiga into a county with optimum socio-economic and political sustainability and an equitable and secure society" highlights the County Government's priorities over the next five years. This CIDP has been formulated taking into account both the Constitution and the priorities of the County Government's manifesto.

This CIDP builds on the achievements of the 2013-17 CIDP while considering the critical, remaining and emerging challenges during that plan period. This CIDP has been aligned to the Kenya Vision 2030 and the MTPs with regard to the foundations of national transformation, the economic, social and political pillars. The CIDP approaches the Constitution's Fourth Schedule on devolved functions and aligns them to the Kenya **Vision 2030** philosophy and the implementing MTPs.

This CIDP integrates the proposed international community development goals now known as Global Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) for the post 2015 period.

3.2 Progress Achieved under 2013-17 CIDP


During the 2013-17 CIDP, various achievements were recorded across the County's departments. although majority are not verifiable. Among them key achievements were:

- 81,630 farmers benefited from the fertiliser subsidy programme; 110,000 farmers benefited from tissue culture banana seedlings that increased area under cultivation by 330 acres; 152,600 farmers were reached through extension services and 562,500 tea seedlings were distributed to tea farmers.
- 5,000 farmers benefited from the initial 560 breeding rabbits, 36 breeding pigs distributed to 6 groups, 6 chicken incubators issued in Sabatia West Ward and 100 beehives distributed in the entire County. Under disease surveillance programme, 130,659 cattle, 9317 dogs and cats were vaccinated while 3,879 cattle were artificially inseminated.





- 21 new cooperative societies were established, two coolers and 10 motorcycles were procured for field work.
- Under Urban, Physical Planning and Housing Development, 26 acres of land were purchased for land banking, Geographical Information System (GIS) lab was started, the Valuation and Rating Act was legislated, County spatial plan was formulated and 12 integrated strategic urban development plans for urban centres were formulated.
- 400 kilometres of new access roads were opened, while 216 kilometres of access roads were rehabilitated across the County.
- The County Government installed solar street lighting in Mbale, Mudete, Mahanga, Chavakali, Shamakhokho, Jeptulu, Lunyerere water supply, Mulele-Magada road and Luanda town.
- Vihiga County Community Empowerment Fund rolled out in 3,690 beneficiaries loaned KES 45,008,449.
- Vihiga Trade Development Joint Loan Board scheme was implemented with 153 beneficiaries receiving KES13,850,000.
- 3,843 entrepreneurs were trained on entrepreneurship skills.
- Roll out of school bursary and scholarship to selected students was initiated.
- Recruitment of ECD teachers and vocation training instructors was initiated.
- Construction of 32 ECD centres was started.
- Construction of hospital plaza at Vihiga County Referral Hospital was started.
- 362 health workers were recruited, 57 officers were trained and 13 new facilities were constructed.
- Equipped two facilities, Vihiga Referral County Hospital and Emuhaya Sub-County.
- HIV positive pregnant mothers receiving preventive ARVs improved from 82.4% in 2014 to 99.1% in 2017.
- Free maternity services were implemented recording improvement in skilled deliveries from a low baseline of 38% to 51%.
- The average attendance of fourth ANC visit improved from 48% to 60 %. There was an increase in exclusive breast feeding from 26% in 2014 to 65% in 2017.
- The percentage of children under five years with stunting dropped from 23.5% to 14.6% due to increased nutritional supplements.
- HIV and AIDS prevalence dropped from 5.1% to 4.7%.
- Percentage of household with latrines improved from 86.4% in 2014 to 90% in 2017.
- Improvement of water sources through construction and rehabilitation of 136 water springs, rehabilitation of 15 shallow wells with hand pumps and construction of 4 new shallow wells equipped with hand pumps; 9 boreholes were drilled and equipped; expansion support of 1 existing water project at Muhanda.
- Rehabilitation of 8 piped water schemes at Maseno, Kaimosi, Mbale, Sosiani, Vihiga, Vokoli, Hamisi and Chango.
- Construction of new flagship water projects with high impact at Majengo-Gisambai Water project was started.
- Construction of public sanitation facilities at Mbale Town; County headquarters; Keveye Luanda, Kima, Mwibona Luanda, Esibuye, Cheptulu and Ilungu markets.
- Augmentation of 3 main urban water schemes at Mbale, Maseno and Kaimosi through the Belgian and Government of Kenya co-operation commenced with rehabilitation of 200 m³ elevated steel tank at Mbale.
- 13,000 tree seedlings were planted at Emabungo hills, water catchment areas, public institutions and Maragoli hills.





- Moses Mudamba Mudavadi cultural centre site was identified but remains undeveloped.
- Kidundu and Hamisi sports ground were identified and only 30% of the perimeter wall was done.
- There was promotion of sporting activity through the establishment of Vihiga United and Vihiga Queens football clubs that have done very well.
- Maragoli, Bunyore, Tiriki and Terik cultural festivals were promoted on annual basis.


3.3 Critical Issues, Remaining and Emerging Challenges

Despite the achievements realised over the 2013-17 CIDP period, the County still faces significant development challenges which need to be addressed during implementation of the 2018-22 CIDP. The challenges include:

- Poor county governance structure and lack of capacity and capability.
- Delayed and inconsistent release of funds from the National Government.
- Critical support services like procurement remained centralised.
- The 2013-17 CIDP was not guided by 10 year Sector Plans as required by the County Governments Act, 2012.
- Inadequate capacity in planning, budgeting and budget implementation from a programme based approach.
- Weak institutional, policy and legal frameworks.
- Corruption incidences towards public service delivery.
- Unstructured public participation.
- Negative public sector attitudes among staff.
- General wasteful expenditure.
- Inconsistent linkages between the CIDP priorities and actual implementation during the MTEF.
- Ineffective monitoring and evaluation framework.
- Negative impacts of climate change.
- High unemployment levels especially of the youth.
- Inadequate public infrastructure including road network, school, vocational training and hospital facilities.
- Unclear guidance on the implementation framework with regard to provisions of Article 187 of the Constitution and engagement of development partners on grants and donations as provided for in Sections 138 and 139 of the PFMA.
- Weak structures regarding collection of own sources of revenue.
- High wage bill and recurrent cost as well as pending bills.

3.4 Harmonisation of the Priority Areas with the Sustainable Development Goals

The seventeen SDGs have time-bound targets and indicators for measuring progress in the areas of: poverty alleviation, education, gender equality and empowerment of women, child and maternal health, reducing HIV and AIDS and communicable diseases, environmental sustainability, and building a Global Partnership for Development.





In September 2015, UN member countries adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its 17 Sustainable Development Goals. As part of implementing the SDGs, the government of Kenya has already published and launched its Road Map to achieving SDGs. The Road Map envisages a partnership with all stakeholders as well as building capacity for devolved governments to implement the SDGs.

The domestication and integration of the SDGs will be imbedded in MTPs and CIDPs. The policies, programmes and projects outlined in this CIDP have integrated and been aligned with the objectives of all of the 17 SDGs which include:

Goal 1: No Poverty

The population of the county living below the poverty level is 39 %. During the plan period, the County Government has planned to establish an EEZ aimed at providing employment opportunity and upscale social protection programme, food security initiatives and employment creation.

Goal 2: Zero Hunger

The County Government has planned to implement food security initiatives which include enhanced crop and livestock production, fish production and agribusiness and value addition.

Goal 3: Good Health and Well Being

During the plan period, the county has planned to implement preventive health services, curative services, county pharmaceutical services and strengthening referral system to improve health indicators.

Goal 4: Quality Education

During the plan period, the County Government has planned to enhance access to quality child care, early childhood education and technical training through specific programmes. In collaboration with the National Government and other stakeholders, efforts will be made to improve access and quality of primary, secondary and tertiary education.

Goal 5: Gender Equality


Sustained campaigns to have a third of gender representation in the workforce has almost bore fruits within Vihiga County. Great strides have been made in terms of empowering women through the introduction of Women Enterprise Development Fund, Youth Fund, Vihiga Community Empowerment Fund. More opportunities for women and youth have been planned for to encourage their participation various county activities.

Goal 6: Clean Water and Sanitation

The county intends to improve access to clean and safe water and sanitation services by investing in water infrastructure, sanitation and environmental management conservation programmes. To this end, the County Government is collaborating with Belgium Government to expand water schemes.

Goal 7: Affordable and Clean Energy

Efforts to revive a hydroelectric power station at Kaimosi dam to meet the increasing demand for electricity have been started. Promotion of solar as an alternative source of energy to minimize destruction of forests and environmental degradation will be pursued. The County will also pursue promotion of energy saving stoves and use of biogas.





Goal 8: Decent Work and Economic Growth

The County Government in effort to attain this goal has started funding programmes such as the community empowerment fund to bolster economic activities. The County Government has also directed resources towards creation of investment opportunities for industrial development and agro processing through partnership with EPZA for the establishment of an industrial park at Kaimosi.

Goal 9: Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure

Resources will be directed towards creation of investment opportunities for industrial development such as EPZ in Kaimosi and granite processing factory in Emuhaya. More Jua Kali shades will be established in the pre-urban areas and Jua Kali associations strengthened. The County will continue to implement routine maintenance of roads and expansion of existing roads including upgrading to bitumen standards.

Goal 10: Reduced Inequalities

The County Government has planned initiatives to reduce inequalities in income, governance, employment as well as gender biased, disability, ethnicity and religion through policy formulation and civic education.

Goal 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities

During the plan period, the County Government will implement the master plans for its major urban areas. In collaboration with the National Government, the County will develop policies and a development plan that will take into account the specific needs and characteristics of existing urban areas in the County that are essential to sustainable development. Measures will be taken to reduce the pollution of the environment in these urban centres through a waste management to ensure the continued sustainability of the existing urban centres in Vihiga County.

Goal 12: Responsible Consumption and Production


Sustainable growth and development requires minimizing the natural resources and toxic materials used, and the waste and pollutants generated throughout the entire production and consumption process. During the plan period, the county plans to recycle waste, promote organic farming, focus on reducing post harvest losses, promote production and consumption of indigenous crops.

Goal 13: Climate Action

Climate change remains a perennial threat to development. Widespread unprecedented effects disproportionately burden development initiatives. Climate change has been felt in the county as varying high temperatures and erratic rainfall patterns are recorded. The County Government has planned to promote green economy strategies and climate—smart agriculture through formulation of climate change policy and law.

Goal 14: Life Below Water

According to UNDP, oceans, seas and other marine resources are essential to human well-being and social and economic development worldwide. Their conservation and sustainable use are central to achieving the 2030 agenda. Fisheries contribute significantly to global food security, livelihoods and the economy. To achieve a healthy balance, fish stocks must be maintained within biologically sustainable limits, at or above the abundance level that can produce the maximum sustainable yield. The County will endeavour to protect and sustain its water sources and promote aquaculture.





Goal 15: Life on Land

Efforts will be made to ensure that the benefits of land based ecosystem, including sustainable livelihoods will be enjoyed for generations through conservation measures and sustainable utilisation of the natural resources. As a result, the County Government in collaboration with KFS has planned to undertake agro forestry promotion activities and planting of indigenous trees across the county.

Goal 16: Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions

Central to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development is the need to promote peaceful and inclusive societies based on respect for human rights, the rule of law and transparent, effective and accountable institutions. The county has to this effect strengthened the "nyumba kumi" initiative as well as work in collaboration with the National Government to establish a High Court to help in the quick adjudication of cases. The cohesion and integration of communities in the County will be promoted and County Policing Authority as well as Council of Elders established to spearhead the same.

Goal 17: Partnerships for the Goals

Achieving the ambitious targets of the 2030 Agenda requires revitalised and enhanced global partnerships that bring together governments, civil society, the private sector and development partners in mobilising the required resources. The County Government plans to implement the Public Private Partnership (PPP) Act in order to engage partners dealing with development initiatives and socio-cultural and governance programs.


3.5 Priority Areas to be Addressed Under the 2018-22 CIDP

This CIDP outlines the policies, legal and institutional reforms and the programmes and projects that will be implemented over the five-year period to transform Vihiga into a county with optimum socio-economic and political sustainability and an equitable and secure society. The following are among the key priority areas that the government will implement over the plan period:

Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs): A key objective of this CIDP is to implement policies, programmes and projects that will facilitate the attainment of the 17 SDGs. All county departments and entities will be expected to report on the relevant monitoring indicators identified by the Kenya National Bureau of Statistics out of the 230 Global Indicators.

Green Energy Strategy: This CIDP will focus on promotion of green energy interventions including deliberate programmes and projects on waste management and recycling and renewable energy generated from solar and wind.

Agriculture and Food Security: The County Government will develop and implement projects and programmes aimed at promoting smart agriculture including zero and minimum tillage, sustainable production and preservation of indigenous seeds and other plant and animal matter and the growing and consumption of traditional foods and conservation agriculture. The County government will also focus on long term soil conservation programmes. Smallholder agriculture model programmes will be prioritised with the aim of improved incomes and food security.





The government will also focus on promotion of horticulture, value chain promotion and value addition on the farm and through co-operatives. Fish farming will be prioritised and promoted alongside poultry, dairy and beekeeping through scientific and technological advances. Agroforestry programme to ensure every homestead has indigenous trees, bamboo and non-indigenous fruit trees on at least 10% of its land.


Public Sector Reforms: This CIDP will focus on programmes that will ensure establishment and implementation of institutional, legal and regulatory framework aimed at strengthening the public sector. The County Government will put in place a public participation policy and strategy and a comprehensive public participation law and guidelines and ensure effective public participation. This CIDP will also define programmes that will ensure transparent and accountable public resources mobilisation, utilisation and management. Further, anti-corruption and county values polices will be formulated and implemented.

Human Resources Development and Management: This CIDP will focus on programmes that will carry out a systematic campaign to transform our people's thinking to go beyond subsistence survival to thinking innovatively for increased income and sustainability. The County Government will promote the culture of enterprise creation especially by young people, to replace the current preoccupation with being employed and employing people where there are no value adding opportunities. The CIDP will also prioritise and promote applied sciences and technical training with a strong emphasis on technical and vocational skills training. Further, county youth service programs will be introduced to promote patriotism, discipline and responsibility.

Health Services: The County Government will prioritise health services programmes including public healthcare, deliberate investment in public and community health infrastructure and services to ensure the population adopts healthy living habits and disease prevention. The County Government will develop sustainable human resources for the health and medical services sector. Promotion of MCH, preventive and curative health initiatives and access to health services will also be prioritised. Also, promotion of health insurance will be undertaken.

Water and Sanitation: The County Government will invest in the development of water supply and sanitation systems in both rural and urban areas and county institutions, as well as community managed water systems in every sub-county. The County Government will also promote ground and rainwater harvesting and conservation of water sources, basins and towers including conservation of water catchment areas and sources, as well as the protection of natural water springs, riparian areas and wetlands. Efforts will be made to establish water bottling company.

Trade, Industry and Commerce: The County Government will focus on promoting micro-industries in processing and value addition aimed at employment creation, wealth creation and minimising post harvest losses. Focus will also be centred towards reviving, supporting and standardising cottage industries and promoting service industry. Specific programmes will be designed to promote marketing and micro financing through establishment of cooperative societies. Further, promotion of tourism will be undertaken through development of tourism facilities and promotion of eco-tourism and cultural tourism as well as conferencing.






Infrastructure and Communication: The County Government will prioritise investments in paving new access roads, maintenance and improvement of the existing paved roads in urban areas to bitumen standards. The County Government will also prioritise high speed internet connectivity aimed at reliable communication. ICT will be promoted as a backbone for development and creation of jobs for the youth. Legal framework will be put in place for effective and efficient management of the transport system.

Education: Recognizing the importance of Early Childhood Education and Development on the overall emotional, physical and social development of the individual, the County Government will invest in developing, equipping and staffing of early childhood education and development centres at all public primary school in the County. The County Government will set up an "Education Improvement Fund" through which public primary and secondary schools will be supported. The County Government will invest in building the capacity of technical and vocational colleges in all sub counties and prioritise completion of the two that are under construction in Emuhaya and Sabatia, and renovation of existing ones, equipping them with modern equipment and ensuring they have qualified managers and staff. The County Government will offer full scholarships to post-high school students opting for technical and vocational skills training. This will also ensure that the County will become a "to-go-to" source of high quality technicians for the Kenyan and international markets by investing in facilities for technical skills and vocational training. Depending on availability of resources, infrastructure of our secondary schools and tertiary institutions will be improved.

Land, Environment and Natural Resources: The County Government will prioritise institutional, policy and legal framework reforms to guide utilisation of land, environment and natural resources. The County Government will also prioritise physical planning and mapping. In this regard, County Spatial and towns plans will be prepared and under World Bank Urban Support Program, Vihiga Municipality will be established and managed by an independent board.

Security and Disaster Management: Security is necessary for any form of development and for peace and unity. The County Government in collaboration with the National Government will ensure that security is maintained through regular patrols, community policing and establishment of County Policing Authority. The county government will install lighting in all towns and markets and will provide toll-free telephone number for crime and disaster reporting by the public. The county government will also establish a disaster management unit that will be equipped with fire engine and fire fighting equipment and qualified staff as well as enacting disaster management policy.







CHAPTER 4

4.1 Overview

Achievement of programme and project goals in the economic, social and political pillars is dependent on specific foundations namely, Transport, Infrastructure and Communication, Administration of County Affairs, Land Reforms, Values and Ethics, Security, Peace Building and Conflict Resolution and Own Sources of Revenue Reforms.

4.2 Transport, Infrastructure and Communication

Vision: World class provider of cost-effective transport, public utility infrastructure facilities and services and ICT

Infrastructure plays a critical role of facilitating and accelerating socio-economic development in the county. Investment in infrastructure programmes and projects will focus on accessibility, quality, functionality, job creation, disaster preparedness and protection of the environment. Over the medium-term, the County Government will continue investing in infrastructure development to further support development in other sectors. The County Government will prioritise investment in paving, maintaining and rehabilitating existing feeder roads and opening of new rural access roads. Investment in ICT infrastructure services will include fibre connectivity and establishment of ICT hubs. The programmes and projects in this sector aim at addressing SDG 9 over the medium-term.

Situation Analysis

During the 2013-17 CIDP:

- 400 kilometres of new access roads were opened;
- 216 kilometres of access roads were rehabilitated;
- Bridges, box culverts and footbridges were also constructed across wards
- County Government installed solar street lighting in Mbale, Mudete, Mahanga, Chavakali, Shamakhokho, Jeptulu, Lunyerere water supply, Mulele-Magada road and Luanda town.

Emerging Issues and Challenges

Emerging issues and challenges that inhibited effective and efficient implementation of policies, projects and programmes during the 2013-17 CIDP period included:

- Weak linkage in planning, budgeting and execution of budgets;
- Inadequate funding for maintenance;
- Inadequate personnel and technical staff for supervision of projects;
- Inadequate road construction machinery and equipment;
- High costs of motor vehicle and machinery maintenance;
- Limited capacity of the contractors in terms of finances, equipment and trained manpower;
- Poor terrain in some areas for instance Maragoli South affecting design of access roads.






Programmes and Projects for 2018-22

Flagship Programmes and Projects

- Low Volume Seal Roads Project: The County Government plans to upgrade 150 kilometres of roads to bitumen standards. The roads will be selected based on their commercial importance
- ICT Resource and Data Centre: The County Government plans to establish two ICT resource centres to enhance communication and service delivery. The County Government plans to establish one data centre aimed to improve planning and service delivery. Ensure availability of fibre optic connection at sub-county level to enhance internet connectivity and establishment of ICT hubs.
- Establishment and equipping of ICT laboratories in all public learning institutions in the County and ICT hubs at all sub-county levels.
- Construct and equip mechanical unit
- Establishment of County Fire Station
- Establish a GIS lab
- Establishment of Bus Parks, Bodaboda shades and parking in our major towns
- Rehabilitation of Kaimosi Airstrip


4.3 Public Sector Reforms

Vision: A transformed and accountable public service providing efficient and quality services the citizenry

Public sector reforms will continue to be guided by the principles in the Constitution and the Kenya Vision 2030 which bind all public officers to observe the principles of good governance; professionalism; high patriotism, ethics and integrity; a public service ecosystem and environment that is harmonious, inclusive, diverse and sustainable; and leveraging on innovation, science and technology. The county plan public sector reforms and transformation aimed at achieving the set targets in SDG 16.

Situation Analysis

• During the first CIDP, the County made progress in the education sector. Among the achievements were:





- A two storey building started by the municipal council was completed, equipped and furnished;
- The county assembly constructed offices, canteen and lounge rooms;
- There were attempts to develop, introduce and institutionalise performance based management practices;
- Contributory pension and superannuation scheme and a comprehensive medical insurance scheme for all civil servants were introduced;
- Uniforms for county administrators and enforcement officers were procured.

Emerging Issues and Challenges

The following challenges emerged during the implementation of programmes and projects in that medium term:

- Uncontrolled employment leading to unsustainable wage bill
- Weak policy, legal framework and institutional capacities
- Negative public service culture
- Entrenched corruption in service delivery
- Inadequate emphasis on value and ethics
- Inadequate office infrastructure supporting County functions
- Inadequate or lack of qualified technical staff

CHAPTER 5 THE ECONOMIC PILLAR

5.1 Overview

Kenya **Vision 2030** identified six priority sectors with high potential of spurring the country's economic growth and development. The sectors are: tourism, agriculture and livestock, wholesale and retail trade, manufacturing, business process outsourcing/IT Enabled Services and financial services. These sectors will drive achievement of 10 percent GDP growth by 2017. In this regard, the County Government of Vihiga, and in line with the Fourth Schedule of the Constitution, has identified Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Cooperatives and Trade, Industry, Tourism and Entrepreneurship as priority sectors to drive the County's economic growth.

5.2 Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Co-operatives

Vision: Innovative, commercially oriented, competitive and modern agriculture, livestock and fisheries

Agriculture is practiced on smallholder farms with focus on crop, livestock and fisheries production. Tea farming considered as a cash crop in the County supported by Mudete Tea factor under KTDA. Other farming practices are for domestic consumption and retail purposes. The planned programmes and projects under this sector aim at achieving SDG 1, 2, 3 and 13

Situation Analysis

During the 2013-17 CIDP the following achievements were made:

- **Crop development and management**: 81,630 farmers benefited from the fertilizer subsidy programme, 110,000 farmers benefited from tissue culture banana seedlings that increased area under cultivation by 330 acres, 152,600 farmers were reached through extension services and 562,500 tea seedlings were distributed to tea farmers.
- **Livestock development and management:** 5,000 farmers benefited from the initial 560 breeding rabbits, 36 breeding pigs were distributed to 6 community groups, 6 chicken incubators issued in Sabatia West Ward and 100 beehives distributed in the entire county. Under disease surveillance programme 130,659 cattle, 9317 dogs and cats were vaccinated while 3,879 cattle were artificially inseminated.
- Cooperative development and management: 21 new Co-operatives were established, two coolers and 10 motorcycles were procured for field work.



- Low adoption of modern technology including small farm machinery.
- Post harvest losses.
- Inadequate capital and poor access to affordable credit.
- Lack of quality fingerlings and fish feeds
- Inadequate feeds, poor livestock breeds, and production systems.
- Weak regulatory and institutional framework
- Poor market access and linkages




5.3 Trade, Industry, Tourism and Entrepreneurship

- Vihiga Trade Development Joint Loan Board scheme was implemented with 153 beneficiaries receiving KES13,850,000
- 3,843 entrepreneurs were trained on entrepreneurship skills.
- The County hosted Miss Tourism Kenya finals aimed at promoting investment and tourism opportunities.





6.1 Overview

This CIDP will focus on implementation of policies, programmes and projects in each of these sectors to ensure that they contribute towards prosperity and building a just and cohesive society that enjoys equitable social development in a clean and secure environment.

6.2 Education, Science and Technical Vocational Training

Vision: Globally competitive education, training, research and innovation for sustainable development

The Constitution provides for free and compulsory basic education which ensures no one is left behind in the walk towards prosperity. This is line with the Sustainable Development Goals and Africa's Agenda 2063 that emphasise inclusive and equitable quality education and promotion of lifelong learning opportunities for all. The development priorities under this sector aim at realising SDG 4 and 9.

Situation Analysis


During the first CIDP, the County made progress in the education sector. Among the achievements were:

- School bursary and scholarship to selected students was initiated;
- Recruitment of ECD teachers and vocation training instructors was initiated;
- Construction of 32 ECD centres was started.

Emerging Issues and Challenges

The following challenges emerged during the implementation of projects and programmes in the 2013-17 CIDP:

- Weak policy, legal framework and institutional structures;
- Weak Board of Management Committees in Vocational Training and ECD centres;
- High demand for bursaries due to increasing levels of poverty;
- High enrolments as a result of FPE has overstretched facilities like desks, books and teaching staff;
- The impact of HIV and AIDS has manifested in loss of teachers through death, sickness and long periods of absenteeism and increased number of orphans and vulnerable children;
- High dropout rates for boys;
- Low enrolments and retention in vocational training centres;
- Inadequate teaching staff in education institutions.



6.3 Health Services


Vision: A globally competitive, healthy and productive County

The investment areas articulated in the Kenya Vision 2030 to attain the highest standards of health as enshrined in the Constitution include access, equity, quality, capacity and institutional frameworks. The Kenya Health Policy 2014-2030 identifies eight health policy orientations that are aligned to the five investment focus areas of the Vision. Over the medium-term plan period, the County Government will implement programmes

Situation Analysis

During the first medium-term, the County made progress in health services. Among the achievements were:

- Construction of Hospital plaza at Vihiga County Referral Hospital was started but stalled;
- 362 health workers were recruited, 57 officers were trained and 13 new facilities were constructed.





- Equipped two facilities, Vihiga Referral County Hospital and Emuhaya Sub-County;
- HIV positive pregnant mothers receiving preventive ARVs improved from 82.4% in 2014 to 99.1% in 2017;
- Free maternity services were implemented recording improvement in skilled deliveries from a low baseline of 38% to 51%;
- The average attendance of fourth ANC visit improved from 48% to 60 %. There was an increase in exclusive breast feeding from 26% in 2014 to 65% in 2017;
- The percentage of children under five years with stunting dropped from 23.5% to 14.6% due to increased nutritional supplements;
- HIV and AIDS prevalence dropped from 5.1% to 4.7%;
- Percentage of household with latrines improved from 86.4% in 2014 to 90% in 2017;

Emerging Issues and Challenges

The following challenges emerged during the implementation of programmes and projects in that medium-term:

- Weak policy, legal framework and institutional capacities;
- Lack of a comprehensive and updated inventory for all health facilities and equipment;
- There was low uptake of family planning services during the entire plan period due to stock out and over reliant on one family planning method;
- Under-funding of the department
- There were frequent stock outs of medical commodities across all facilities due to nonpayments and lengthy procurement;
- Lack of a warehouse for stocking medical supplies at the county and sub-counties;
- Incidences in industrial action of health workers due to delays in payment of salaries and signing of collective bargaining agreement hampering service delivery;
- Inadequate water supply in health facilities thus hindering good sanitation;
- Health interventions for HIV and AIDS, TB and malaria didn't receive adequate financial support and to a large extent depended on donor funding. TB poses a problem of inadequate infrastructure such as laboratory space and chest clinics; equipment for diagnosis and drug resistance;
- Minimal involvement of department during planning, design and implementation of projects
- Due to transit position, County is prone to communicable diseases;
- Some departments at County Referral Hospital were not well equipped such as eye, dental, among others;
- Most of the health facilities are understaffed;
- Lack of basic infrastructure in health facilities:
- Lack of emergency preparedness in the county;
- Multi-drug resistance opportunistic diseases and possibility of withdrawal of funds by development partners posed a challenge to the department;
- Poor linkages between the community and the facility;
- Lack of updated data on some of the health indicators.



6.4 Environment, Water, Energy and Natural Resources

Vision: Clean, healthy, safe and sustainably managed environment

The goal of the Environment, Water and Energy and Natural Resources sector is to enhance a clean, safe and sustainable environment, natural resources and access to water and sanitation services for all. The sector has a fundamental role in the economy as it plays a critical role in securing the stewarding and sustaining the natural capital of the County. The sector has critical linkages with the main productive sectors such as agriculture, tourism, manufacturing and energy, among others that depend on use of natural resources that are derived from the environment. The development priorities under this sector are aimed at realising SDG 6, 7, 13, 14 and 15.

Situation Analysis


During the first CIDP, the County made the following achievements with regard to Environment, Water and Energy and Natural Resources:

- Improvement of water sources through construction and rehabilitation of 136 water springs, rehabilitation of 15 shallow wells with hand pumps and construction of 4 new shallow wells equipped with hand pumps; 9 boreholes were drilled and equipped; expansion support of 1 existing water project at Muhanda;
- Rehabilitation of 8 piped water schemes at Maseno, Kaimosi, Mbale, Sosiani, Vihiga, Vokoli, Hamisi and Chango;
- Construction of new flagship water projects with high impact at Majengo-Gisambai Water project was started;
- Construction of public sanitation facilities at Mbale Town; County headquarters; Keveye Luanda, Kima, Mwibona Luanda, Esibuye, Cheptulu and Ilungu Markets;
- Augmentation of 3 main urban water schemes at Mbale, Maseno and Kaimosi Water through the Belgian and Government of Kenya co-operation commenced with Rehabilitation of 200 m3 elevated steel tank at Mbale;
- 13,000 tree seedlings were planted at Emabungo hills, water catchment areas, public institutions and Maragoli hills.

Emerging Issues and Challenges

The following challenges emerged during the implementation of programmes and projects in that medium-term:

- Weak policy, legal framework and institutional capacities;
- Low adoption of green energy;
- Delayed and inadequate funding;
- Damage to water infrastructure through road constructions;
- High operation costs in water schemes, notably high cost of electricity;
- Inadequate skilled staff;
- Inadequate capacity in management of community-based water schemes;
- Inadequate public sanitation facilities in markets and urban centres;
- Unresolved challenges in water as a devolved function;
- Low capacity in adoption irrigation technology;
- Uncontrolled planting of eucalyptus trees;
- Rain water harvesting has not been embraced in the County;





- Poor garbage collection mechanisms and a lack of proper dumpsite in the County;
- Destruction of forest cover in most parts of the County;
- Uncontrolled sand harvesting leading to erosion;
- Unprotected water sources and towers;
- Unreliable supply of electricity;
- Proposed hydro-power plants at Kaimosi and Galagoli stalled due to non-funding.

- Promotion of environmental education and awareness.



6.5 Physical Planning, Land and Housing


Vision: Sustainable land management, modern urban infrastructure and affordable and quality housing

The County's population is projected to grow from 637,877 in 2017 to 694,819 in 2022. The increase in population in both urban and rural areas exerts pressure on land and available resources. This leads to a number of challenges which include increased demand for socio-economic services. Deliberate programmes and projects under this sector aim at realising SDG 11.

Situation Analysis

During the ending medium-term period the County made the following achievements while implementing programmes and projects in Physical Planning, Land and Housing sector:

- 26 acres of land were purchased for land banking;
- Geographical Information System (GIS) lab was started but stalled;
- Valuation and Rating Act was legislated but not finalized;
- County spatial plan was formulated but not handed over by consultant;
- 12 integrated strategic urban development plans for urban centres were formulated but not handed over by the consultant.





Emerging Issues and Challenges

The following challenges emerged during the implementation of programmes and projects in that medium-term:

- The continued existence of manual land information system that often leads to slow service delivery and accountability challenges;
- The social housing scheme stalled due to poor project conceptualisation;
- Inadequate space for development;
- Unplanned urban development;
- Land subdivisions;
- Weak policy, legal framework and institutional capacities;
- Delayed funding of programmes and projects.



6.6 Youth, Gender, Sports, Culture and Social Services

Vision: Productive workforce, equal opportunities, conserved heritage and vibrant arts and sports industry

The County's population is projected to grow from 637,877 in 2017 to 694,819 in 2022. The increase in population in both urban and rural areas exerts pressure on land and available resources. This leads to a number of challenges which include increased demand for socio-economic services.

Sports and Culture play crucial role in overall development of the County's economy and well-being of its people in twofold. Firstly, through development and promotion of sports and secondly, through promotion and exploitation of the County's diverse culture. The programmes and projects under this sector aim at promoting equality and social protection as required in SDG 5 and 10.

Situation Analysis


Achievements in the Youth, Gender, Sports, Culture and Social Services sector during the ending medium-term were:

- Moses Mudamba Mudavadi cultural centre site was identified but remains undeveloped;
- Kidundu and Hamisi sports ground were identified and 30% of the perimeter wall done;
- There was promotion of sporting activity through the establishment of Vihiga United and Vihiga Queens football clubs that have done very well;
- Maragoli, Bunyore, Tiriki and Terik cultural festivals were promoted on annual basis.

Emerging Issues and Challenges

The following challenges emerged during the implementation of programmes and projects in that medium-term:

- Weak policy, legal framework and institutional capacities;
- Lack of an integrated framework to guide the creation of green jobs;
- Poor designs and most of the contractors awarded the projects had capacity limitations and poor supervision was done, thus leading to the collapse and stalling of many construction projects under this sector;
- High cases of violence against women and children;
- High incidence of erosion of cultural values;
- Little focus on the promotion of talents and sporting activities;
- Increased rise in the number of orphans and vulnerable children in the society with little attention been given to their needs;
- Increased population of elderly people in the society, who have never been employed and also lack means of making a living;
- Majority of the youth lack employment and collateral that can enable them secure bank loans
 and other financial services. There is also increased indulgence of the youth in drugs and
 substance abuse which has rendered many unproductive thus hindering their contribution to
 county development;





- Gender inequalities in the society, with a majority of women being neglected and undermined. In addition, most women lack collateral and security to access credit from financial institutions to start-up businesses;
- Inadequate recreational facilities in the county.



- Establishment of talent and empowerment centres;
- Establishment of gender-based violence centres;
- Capacity building and registration of community-based organisations;
- Promotion of affirmative action funds.

CHAPTER 7 THE POLITICAL PILLAR



The Governor, Deputy Governor, Speaker of the County Assembly of Vihiga and the Clerk of the County Assembly with all the MCAs of Vihiga County.



7.1 Overview

The political pillar envisages a democratic political system that is issue-based, people-centred, result oriented and accountable to the public. Since the inauguration of the Constitution, progress has been made in advancing strategic political, governance and institutional reforms and these include enactment of legislation mandated by the Constitution, establishment of new governance institutions at national and county levels, civic education, judicial transformation, police reforms, reforms in prisons and correctional services, changes in the electoral processes, promoting national cohesion and social integration, transparency and accountability and the rule of law. In addition, the *Constitution of Kenya, 2010* devolves considerable functions and powers to the county governments, which include agriculture, health services, control of air and other pollution, cultural activities, transport, animal control and welfare, trade development, planning and development, pre-primary education, natural resources and environmental conservation, public works and services, fire fighting services and disaster management, control of drugs and pornography and co-ordinating participation of communities.

7.2 Good governance


Our political philosophy and platform is Social Democracy. This philosophy believes that a successful Government is built through teamwork, and ensures promotion of social, economic, cultural and political development opportunities for everyone. The County Government shall therefore, engage political and development partners locally, nationally, regionally and internationally, who subscribe to the philosophy of Social Democracy. We will solidly remain part of the political movement and allies that believe in and promote social democracy in Kenya.

Guided by the Constitution and Laws of Kenya, we shall define and document what the County Government of Vihiga will look like, outlining all the different departments and agencies and how they relate to each other for the service of the people of Vihiga and Kenya.

We will develop a transparent and accountable public resources mobilization, utilization and management system that will include:

- a) A comprehensive, fair and equitable system for local revenue collection and utilisation across the County.
- b) A framework for mobilisation of resources locally, nationally and externally.
- c) A comprehensive public debt management policy.
- d) Efficiency Monitoring Unit to continuously monitor budget implementation and ensure fidelity.
- e) A County Audit Unit to ensure equity and accountability.
- f) A County Planning and Budget Committee to ensure that Planning and budget making process are participatory.

The County Government will develop a comprehensive strategy to fight and prevent corruption in all sectors of our County and Society.

7.3 Public Participation and Civic Education

The County Government will put in place public participation and civic education policies, strategies and comprehensive laws and guidelines and ensure that the County Government prioritises effective public participation and civic education.

7.4 Peace Building and Conflict Resolution

The County will foster unity of purpose among ALL communities of Vihiga County, through dialogue, peace initiatives; a collaborative approach to development and shared prosperity.

The County will convene reconciliation conference whose outputs will be managed and promoted by a publicly funded County Social and Economic Council, whose membership will be drawn from all the communities of Vihiga County, to secure the county integration and cohesion process.

The County will prioritise alternative dispute resolution as envisaged in Article 159 of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010. The County will establish a grievance redress committee that will seek to address and resolve disputes before they escalate to possible litigations. The County will further partner with the County Peace Committee and all arms of National security apparatus. The Governor will roll out the County Policing Authority as stipulated in Section 41 of the National Police Service Act. The authority will ease community policing and management of security in the County.


The following challenges emerged during the implementation of programmes and projects in that medium-term:

CHAPTER 8

THE IMPLEMENTATION, MONITORING AND EVALUATION FRAMEWORK

8.1 Overview

In order to implement this plan effectively, the County Government shall adopt an institutional framework that will enhance co-ordination and efficiency to meet the goals of the plan. This chapter therefore, presents the institutional structure as well as highlighting the various roles of the critical stakeholders and organs that will be used to deliver the aspirations of the residents. This will ensure clarity of roles and provide a basis for performance evaluation. This chapter outlines resources mobilisation, management framework and the monitoring and evaluation framework. It explains how the CIDP will be translated into sector plans and then implemented through the MTEF in order to uphold the linkages in the Public Expenditure Management cycle (PEM).

8.2 Institutional Framework

The County Citizens

The forum comprises of community representatives, the business community, faith-based organisations, civil society representatives and community-based organizations. Their roles will be:

- To identify priority projects and programmes;
- To carry out social accountability of projects and programmes;
- To promote Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation among the people;
- To serve as the community entry and focal point;
- To highlight development challenges;
- To assist in community mobilisation and sensitisation.

County Budget and Economic Forum

The forum shall comprise of the Governor, County Executive Committee members and a number of representatives equal to the number of County Executive Committee members appointed by the Governor not being county public officers, equal to the number of executive committee members from persons nominated by organisations representing professionals, business, labour issues, women, persons with disabilities, the elderly and faith-based groups at the county level. Their role is to provide means for consultation by the County Government on:

- Preparation of County plans, County Fiscal Strategy Paper and Budget Review Outlook Paper;
- Matters relating to budgeting, the economy and financial management at the County.

County Assembly

The County Assembly comprises the elected and nominated members, the Speaker, Clerk and the County Assembly Public Service Board. Its role shall be:

- Enacting laws and policies;
- Receiving and approving the development plans and budgets of the county;





- Overseeing the development and promotion of public investments;
- Promotion of value for money on development programmes and projects;
- Watchdog for the executive and promotion of peace and stability.

County Executive

The County Executive comprises the Governor, Deputy Governor and the County Executive Committee Members. Its role in implementation of the CIDP shall be:

- Providing policy direction in the County Government and ensuring proper governance structures are in place;
- Managing and co-ordinating functions for effective implementation of projects and programmes;
- Ensuring implementation of county and other national legislation, as may be required;
- Ensuring implementation and evaluation of the CIDP;
- Ensuring availability of resources for proper implementation of the plan.

Sector Working Groups

Their roles shall be:

- Link the CIDP to the MTEF:
- Ensuring the implementation of programmes and projects spelt out in the plan;
- Providing feedback on the implementation of projects and programmes;
- Ensuring prudent management of resources;
- Co-ordination of programmes and projects to avoid duplication;
- Advising on project design, selection, budgeting, implementation and sustainability;
- Preparing budget estimates for programmes and projects ensuring value for money
- Mobilising resources and supervise implementation of projects.



State and Non State Actors

These comprise the National Government, Semi Autonomous Government Agencies, Independent offices and Commissions and civil society networks. The roles of state and non-state actors include:

- Funding, implementation and advocacy;
- Ensuring prudent management of county finances and resources;
- Human resource development;
- Provision of vital development statistics and information;
- Promotion of peace and ensuring a stable macroeconomic environment.

Monitoring and Evaluation Unit

Monitoring and evaluation includes; National and County Government, Economic Planning department, citizen representation Project Management Committees and Development Partners. Their roles will include:

- Carry out monitoring and evaluation;
- Recommend on monitoring and evaluation policy improvement;
- Generate information for project/programme improvement;
- Review and document best practices;
- Develop monitoring and evaluation tool for departments;
- Preparation of quarterly and annual monitoring and evaluation reports.

8.3 Resource Requirements and Gap

The following are resources required to finance the 2018-22 CIDP with regard to programmes and projects planned to be implemented by each county department.



8.4 Resources Mobilisation and Management Framework

Over and above the revenue spelt in Article 202 (1) and (2) of the Constitution, the County plans to mobilise resources through own sources of revenue and external financing of projects through grants and donations and PPP.

Internal Sources of Revenue (Article 209 of the Constitution of Kenya)

- (i) Fees: The County Government shall charge fees for services, goods and works as legislated by the County Assembly. These can be levied on business licenses, parking services, refuse collection, entertainment joints, use of public grounds/sports ground, access to certain information and approval of physical plans.
- **(ii) Fines:** The County Government will impose fines for non-compliance with County laws, rules and regulations. Specific urban areas, towns and municipalities could have different sets of by-laws and regulations, which attract fines for non-compliance. Some of the fines imposed will include non-payment of rates, wrong parking, causing public nuisances, breaking County laws, rules and regulations.
- (iii) Rates: The rates can be imposed on capital developments and on immovable property such as land within the county. Each business premise is given a certain rate to pay either monthly or per annum, based on the location of the premise. Certain locations attract higher rates such as the Central Business District (CBD), industrial zones and high cost residential estate zones. Peripheral zones away from the CBD and lacking essential services such as electricity, road network, drainage, sewerage, etc. attract low rates.
- **(iv) CESS:** The County may impose taxes for movement of agricultural and livestock produce, construction materials and other products within the county boundaries.
- **(v) Appropriations-In-Aid:** This is County revenue raised internally through sale of official property, assets and investments. The revenue is raised through land transactions, tendering processes, auctioning of serviceable and unserviceable items and other authorized measures.
- (vi) Co-operatives Societies: Co-operatives and Societies have been an enabler of development in Kenya since independence. The County Government shall promote the formation of community co-operatives and societies to encourage savings and investments actions for wealth and employment creation.
- (vii) Own County Investment Incentive Framework: The County Government shall mobilize resources for development by establishing an investment incentive framework focusing on its citizens who live and work outside the County. This can be done through establishment





- of special investment zones for such populations and providing a dedicated department to aid their transactions without bureaucracy.
- (viii) Wealth and Employment Creation Equipment Bank: The County Government shall mobilise revenue to sustain its development through establishing appropriate partnerships with the private sector to create equipment bank. The bank would provide equipment to individuals and registered groups based on appraised need and safety for the equipment. Each beneficiary of the equipment would be required to pay a minimum deposit and stipulated regular payments based on productivity of the ventures engaged in. This way, the County will generate a pool of job creators who will open new businesses or expand existing ones hence creating more revenue for the County Government.
- **(ix) Royalties:** The County Government shall generate revenues from companies utilising natural resources within the county boundaries.
- (x) Research Initiatives: The County Government shall mobilise resources for development by investing in scientific and technological research. This will include research into use of new materials, new methods and renewable energy systems.

External Revenue Sources

- **(i) Foreign Direct Investments:** The County Government shall attract FDI through making substantial investments in improving the business environment, provision of reliable electricity power, increasing the purchasing power of her citizens to create a strong market and entering into beneficial Public-Private Partnerships (PPPs).
- (ii) Foundations: The County Government shall establish a data bank of foundations and establish close working relationships with them to bring about socio-economic development. To be effective in attracting resources from foundations, the County Government would have to formulate an interactive institutional and organizational structure that takes membership from all stakeholders. Some of the foundations serving as sources of community development funds in Kenya include: Living Water Foundation an American Foundation, The Ford Foundation, The Clinton Foundation, Bill Gate Foundation, The Rockefeller Foundation, The Mac Arthur Foundation and The Toyota Foundation.
- (iii) Corporate Social Responsibility: The companies within the county will be encouraged to give back to the community in form of projects and community services.
- (iv) Bilateral Funding: This involves aid flowing from one Government to another. It may take various forms such as: Aid flowing from one Government to a non-governmental organization; Government to Governmental organizations; and Embassies to local projects. For example, Department for International Development (DFID) of the United Kingdom, United States of America agency for International Development (USAID), Danish International Development Agency (DANIDA) for Denmark, The Belgium Government, German Cooperation (GIZ).
- (v) Multilateral Financing: This type of support is regulated by the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 and County Government Act, 2012. It refers to financing that involves more than two nations. Funds are mobilized from many countries and disbursed through global or regional bodies such as Bretton Woods Institutions, The European Union, and The African Development Bank, among others.
- (vi) International Civil Society Organisations: International civil society groups support



various development initiatives in the County. The County Government can establish close working relationships with these organizations to support various development initiatives. This can be done by establishing an interactive database where information on desired developments and conditionality can be exchanged with the aim of generating positive responses. Some of the civil society organizations which provide community development funds in Kenya include: Action Aid, Aga Khan Foundation, Care International, Care Canada, World Vision and Catholic Relief Services etc.

(vii) United Nations Agency: The United Nations Development Assistance Framework (UNDAF) guides collaborative response of the UN system to Kenya's priority development needs while maintaining individual agency mandates. The UN system includes Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), the World Bank (WB), International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD), International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), International Monetary Fund (IMF), United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), World Food Programme (WFP), World Health Organization (WHO), among others. The County Government can partner with any United Nations Agency for the advancement of its development agenda.


8.5 Financial Management Strategies

The National Treasury is expected to design and prescribe an efficient financial management system for the national and county governments to ensure transparent financial management and standard financial reporting. The County Treasury, subject to the Constitution, will:

- Monitor, evaluate and oversee the management of public finances and economic affairs of the County Government including developing and implementing financial and economic policies in the county;
- Preparing the annual budget for the county;
- Co-ordinating the preparation of estimates of revenue and expenditure of the County Government:
- Co-ordinating the implementation of the budget of the County Government
- Mobilizing resources for funding the budgetary requirements of the County Government putting in place mechanisms to raise revenue and resources;
- The County Treasury will also ensure compliance with accounting standards, prescribed and published by the Accounting Standards Board from time to time;
- It will also ensure proper management and control of, and accounting for the finances of the County Government and its entities in order to promote efficient and effective use of the county's budgetary resources.

8.6 Sector Reports and the Medium-Term Expenditure Framework (MTEF)

The county departments will prepare their sector reports latest September during the budget calendar. The sector reports will form the basis of the ADPs, CBROPs, FSPs and PBEs. The sector reports will report on the three years performance and project plans for the next three years. The projected plan will be on the basis of the programmes and projects in the CIDP. The sector reports will further breakdown the sector programmes and projects in the CIDP, into subprogrammes, activities, outcomes, outputs and KPIs. Therefore, there will be a table showing past performance and one showing planned performance based on the CIDP with the said programmes, sub-programmes, activities, outcomes, outputs and KPIs.





8.7 Reporting, Reviewing and Amending the 2018-22 CIDP

The 2018-22 will be reported as follows:

- (i) The Annual Progress Review (APR)
- (ii) Mid-Term Review (MTR)
- (iii) End-Term Review (ETR)

The above reports will inform the revision of the CIDP in accordance to Section 112 of the CGA.

8.8 Monitoring and Evaluation Institutional Framework

The County department of Finance and Economic Planning will establish a Monitoring and Evaluation Unit. The Unit will institute a participatory monitoring and evaluation framework at the community, ward, sub-county and county level. The composition of the monitoring committees shall include community members, heads of implementing departments and the elected leaders. Information obtained from monitoring and evaluation field visits shall be collated and reports made to inform future planning, budgeting and implementation. The Governor will chair the County Executive Committee; and the team composed of county executive officers and other key stakeholders will carry out the monitoring and evaluation.

Further, the Governor will establish in his office a Delivery Unit which will independently conduct monitoring and evaluation of project implementation and directly report to his office.
